



SNGMS Board Meeting Minutes for 7/31/2025

On June 31, 2025, the regular Board of Directors meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at 4:14 PM at the SNGMS Lapidary Shop and Education Center by the President. All board members were present. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited.

Minutes: The minutes of the July 3rd, 2025 meeting were approved as read.

Treasurers Report: Balance of the checking account as of the end of June 2025 was down by approximately \$2,500, and the investment account was essentially unchanged. Upcoming expenses include an August payment for the Viva Las Vegas Rocks! show and a September payment for the SNGMS awards banquet. Lapidary income was down and repair costs are up from 2024.

Unfinished Business:

The five year strategic plan will be presented at the General Meeting. It will be discussed several times before the membership is asked for approval.

Lorrilee Stackhouse reported that Google Workspace for Nonprofits is working and Mary Savage has already uploaded all digitized club newsletters.

Lisa Wiemers, as Historian, introduced a list of document retention policies that were discussed and amended by the Board. She will be digitizing relevant documents and managing the hard copy document storage. The Board decided that the document retention policies should be part of the By Laws. Some Officer and Chair sections of the By Laws may need to be brought up to date and the Parliamentarian, Mike Kirk, will organize a committee to make recommendations on modified By Laws to be presented to the Board and then to the General Membership for approval.

SNGMS Lapidary and Education Center Report: Kerry Wenzel reports that one saw is down and they are short three supervisors.

Viva Las Vegas Rocks Show: Andrea Packo reports that 31 vendor booths have been sold out of a total of 61 booths. Facebook ads are being placed and our website Viva Show page has been updated with added information and links for vendor document and payment, ticket sales, and volunteer opportunity descriptions.

New Business:

Volunteer Hours: Ron Mazz discussed collection of 2025 SNGMS volunteer hours and how that will be done.

Google for Nonprofits: Google workspace training will be done in September for Board members.

Lapidary Equipment: Orville Wiemers is organizing a committee to study the cab machine wheel situation. They will recommend which wheels to purchase and a wheel replacement policy.

SNGMS Outreach: Harvey Bergeron discussed the SNGMS video and having club members speak to other groups in the area to spur interest in the SNGMS. The video need modification to make is looping and Andrea Kincannon is having that done.

Board meeting moved to an executive session, and adjourned at 6:21 pm.

SNGMS General Meeting Minutes for 8/4/2025

On August 4th, 2025, the regular meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at 6:00 PM by the President. The Secretary was present. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited. New members and visitors were introduced and welcomed. Tables with show and tell items were pointed out so that attendees could enjoy them. The minutes of the July 7th, 2025 meeting were approved as read.

Old Business:

Treasurers Report: Balance of the checking account as of the end of the month is down by approximately \$2,500, and the investment account is essentially unchanged. A very successful equipment auction essentially made up for the monthly income loss, thanks to Chops Wenzl, Orville Wiemers, and Bruce Martin.

Kids Club: Wendy Dresser reported on the Kid's Club activities and said thanked everyone that helped or donated to the club. On Sunday, August 10, 2025 the kids will meet at the Lapidary and Education Center to work on their Communication Badge. On September 13, 2025 a field trip to the Dinosaur Discovery Museum in St. George, Utah is planned. During the Viva Las Vegas Show the kids will be doing demonstrations on November 8 and 9, 2025. Plans are underway for a Halloween party in conjunction with the Eagles and for a trip to the Ore Car Mine site for geocaching, rock hounding, and a bar-be-que.

Field trips: Jonathan Tredwell reported on upcoming field trips. See the Polished Slab newsletter and emails for future field trip plans.

Orville Wiemers discussed the destruction of a practically new trip saw blade and members discussed how the equipment should be used to avoid harming it. Suggestions were made including making and putting videos on the website of proper equipment usage. Possible certification was also discussed as well as members taking action if they see unsafe equipment operation.

Orville Wiemers discussed the Strategic Plan and an email of the presentation will be sent to all members. The plan will be revisited in September.

Rock Spotlight Shattuckite

Shattuckite is a relatively rare copper silicate mineral. It was first discovered in 1915 at the Shattuck (sic) copper mine in Bisbee, Arizona (hence the name). Shattuckite has also been found at found at the Betty Jo Claim in White Pine County, Nevada. The Democratic Republic of Congo, Namibia, and southwestern Africa have also produced some shattuckite.


Because of its bright blue and green colors, shattuckite is highly collectible. It's typically found in the oxidized zones of copper deposits, where the primary copper minerals undergo weathering and react with surrounding rocks and minerals. Shattuckite is often found with other copper minerals like malachite, azurite, chrysocolla, and turquoise. These deposits are usually in sedimentary rocks, especially in deserts where copper-bearing solutions percolate through the ground.

Shattuckite often forms as thin veins, crusts, or pockets inside the host rock, instead of large ore bodies. Specifically, it's found as fibrous or botryoidal structures, or as crusts on the walls of cavities. These forms contribute to its visual appeal. It's a fairly soft mineral, with a Mohs hardness of 3.5 - 4.



Shattuckite Specimen from Hummingbird Mine Tonopah, Arizona





Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks Chainmaille


What is Chainmaille?

Chainmaille (also known as chainmail, or simply maille) is armor or jewelry made by connecting metal rings to one another. The word maille comes from the French word for mesh. Creating maille involves a few steps:

- 1) Wrap metal wire around a rod to make a coil.
- 2) Cut the coil to create jump rings
- 3) Using pliers, link the rings (one at a time) into a pattern.

You can buy pre-made jump rings or make your own.

Chain maille started out as a form of armor. People discovered that linked rings created a durable fabric that could protect the body from being cut in battle. Many contemporary jewelry patterns of linking rings have their roots in armor. Several patterns of linking the rings together have been used since ancient times, with the most common being the 4-to-1 pattern (where each ring is linked with four others).

Making Chainmaille

To make chain maille, you need jump rings—lot of them! Two pairs of chain nose pliers are the only tools you'll need for chain maille; a pair of bent nose pliers and a pair of standard chain nose pliers work well.

Pay attention to the inner diameter of your jump rings. If it's too small, you won't be able to link all the rings you need to create your pattern.

Open your jump rings properly. You don't want your jump rings slipping apart after you've spent hours assembling an intricate piece of chain maille jewelry! Always open jump rings by twisting the ends apart, moving perpendicular to one another (north-south). Never open a jump ring by pulling the ends apart (east-west).

If possible, open and close your jump rings only once. As you work with jump rings, the metal hardens and stiffens. If you open and close a jump ring too many times, the metal eventually becomes brittle and breaks. Try to open all your jump rings before you begin linking them, setting them in small, labeled piles on your work surface. This way, you only have to open and close them once (ideally) to prevent breakage in the middle of your project.

Ann Sherman Spector November 21, 1913 – July 19, 1999 Life Time Member

Ann Sherman was born in Chicago. She was a professional dancer, and performed at 1933 Chicago World's Fair with burlesque star Sally Rand. Ann married a musician named Benny Spector. They had two daughters.

Ann and Benny were members of the Chicago Rock and Mineral Society. Ann edited their newsletter, and served as the Chicago rock club's secretary and as the hospitality chair.

Her daughters went to day camp in Chicago, and one of their teachers had a hand-made jade ring. The girls introduced Ann to the teacher, who taught Ann lapidary work and silver smithing. Benny became interested in stone cameos. The family moved to Las Vegas, Nevada, around 1979 and started a business to import cameos, lapidary work, mineral specimens, and objects d'art.

Ann and Benny joined the Clark County Gem Collectors (CCGC) in 1980. Ann served as vice president, program chair, hospitality chair, and as Christmas Bazaar Director. She wrote for *The Polished Slab* newsletter. Both her exhibits and demonstrations drew praise at shows. The Spector home was open to CCGC craft workers and Ann hosted CCGC board meetings for several years.

Benny died in September 1985, but the import business continued. The family blended business and pleasure on twice-a-year buying trips abroad. Ann died in 1999. Ann and Bennie are buried in King David Memorial Chapel and Cemetery Las Vegas, Nevada.

Mineral Musings Grapolite Fossils



Graptolites are colonial marine animals. They were thought to be extinct, but a group of modern deep-sea colonial worm-like filter feeders called pterobranchs have been discovered to be modern graptolites.

Extinct graptolites lived in seas covering central Nevada 541 - 376 million years ago. Graptolites are an important group of index fossils because the evolved rapidly and were widely distributed. They provide valuable insights about geological dates and early ocean ecosystems.

There are thousands of known species. Graptolites lived in many marine habitats, including open oceans, shallow seas, and even freshwater!

What Did Graptolites Look Like?



Graptolites animals lived together in groups or colonies and shared the same skeleton, like an apartment building. Each animal built its own "apartment" or living chamber, and these were stuck together to make the colony. Different species of graptolites had branches with different shapes. They could be straight, curved or even spiral-shaped.

Many graptolite fossils are well preserved. This is partly because the colonies secreted a stiff outer coating that fossilized well.

How Did Graptolites Eat?

Graptolites were filter-feeders and their colonies were usually planktonic, floating in the ocean currents. They used tentacles lined with hairs that helped capture and transport food particles to their mouths.

What Ate Graptolites?

Graptolites were a food source for trilobites, benthic organisms, and other suspension feeders. The extinction of graptolites caused changes in predator-prey relationships and the subsequent rise of new organisms.

Where Are Graptolite Fossils Found?

Graptolite fossils are found worldwide and in sedimentary rocks, most commonly in shales and mudstones. Because the fossils are fragile, careful extraction techniques and preservation methods are needed to obtain complete and detailed specimens. The Vinini Formation between Elko and Ely, Nevada contains graptolite fossils.
