Reminder to Members

Keep your Membership Chairperson, Peggy Sue Moore, informed of changes in your information. You must keep your e-mail and address up to date to continue receiving The Polished Slab newsletter. Dues To Be Paid Before Jan 1

The last date to renew your membership, is January 31st. A renewal after the end of January will result in an interruption in your membership. You must never allow your membership to lapse if you want to maintain continuous (uninterrupted) membership. Many members are already pre-paying, so that they don't have to worry about remembering the deadline.

Reasons to keep an uninterrupted membership:

- 1 You must have a minimum of two uninterrupted years of membership in order to run for any elected office.
- 2 You must have a minimum of one uninterrupted year of membership in order to chair a committee.
- 3 You must have 10 uninterrupted years of membership to become a life member.
- 4 If you fail to renew by January 31st, you may renew and be reinstated for an additional \$5.00 fee.

Shop Report

The wonderful new shop is up and running. Be sure to drop in and check it out. The hours (subject to change based on usage) are Mon & Tues 9 AM to 5 PM, Wed thru Sat 9 AM to 9 PM, and Sun 10 AM to 5 PM. The shop is closed for equipment use on the Thursday before the General Meeting. The charge is now \$5.00 an hour for use of all equipment, except the trim saw, which is \$3.00 an hour. There is easy wheelchair access and there is sit-down space at the Genies.

Certification is now required on all shop equipment. Shop supervisors can help you get qualified for use.

You can come in with no lapidary experience and learn the entire process from rock to cabochon. If you need a rock they are available for \$2.00 a pound. Just wear closed shoes and old clothes (or an apron) and come to the shop for a great experience.

The Rockstars are alive and well and living in Las Vegas!

Our Rockstar chairman, Mary Beth Paladino, has given generously of her time and talent to spark an interest in geology among the youth within both the SNGMS and the larger community.

Since the beginning of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society the Rockstars have been an important part of the club. Originally known as the Pebble Pups, the kids decided they outgrew that name and evolved into the Rockstars. The Rockstars get together at least once a month to do an activity. This month, October 29Th will be our annual Fluorescent Night. Many adults in the club bring their fluorescent lights and rocks that glow to share. This year each kid will receive chalcedony and fluorite which both fluoresce. We then discover what others things glow. Last year our light orange cupcake icing fluoresced green. We always have a good time and are hoping for a good turnout again this year.

The purpose of the Rockstars is to give hands on instruction in geology and lapidary arts to our young members. We go, see, touch and do. The kids love our field trips because we go to places where material is easily accessible. Not only do we study the different kinds of rocks and minerals but we use some of them in art or holiday projects. The borax eggs we collected turned into beautiful Easter eggs and we wire wrapped crystals we had collected, as an example. We also spend time at the shop. Older members partner with Rockstars to teach them how to make cabs and use the Genie correctly. Some of our teenagers have gotten quite good at cabbing and making jewelry.

Doris Currington is the mastermind behind most of our projects. Casting animal tracks was our last month's project when she shared generously by helping the kids make plaster casts from her casts. We are grateful for all the adults who have taken an interest in the Rockstars and donated their time and material to us. We look forward to many new learning adventures and good times. The Rockstars is open to children ages 6 to 18 and welcome all who like to have fun and share our love of rocks!

Our children's program also includes community service. The members of SNGMS are available to go to schools to share their knowledge and rocks with school-age children. We also help Boy and Girl Scouts earn their Geology Badges and Belt Loops. We have gone to church camps, boy scout day camps and many, many schools. We have given sample rocks to thousands of children thanks to the generosity of our members. We

Opal - Facts and Superstition

The opal, October's birthstone, is called "The Queen of Gems." Most opals come from Australia. The most precious type of opal, the black opal, only occur in New Whales, Australia and Virgin Valley, Nevada. Like snowflakes, every opal is unique.

Opals are formed in the cavities of rock, usually sedimentary rock. They consist of silica that collects into spheres of uniform size and distribution in the rock cavities.

The beautiful colors of the opal are created by the way light bounces through the silica spheres and the gaps among the spheres. It bends and is diffracted with the white light split into rainbow colors. The smallest spheres produce blue colors, while the largest ones produce red.


There are precious opals in four basic types: white, black, fire, and crystal or water opals. There are also opals that do not possess the play of light. They are called common opals or potch. They can also be cut and polished to make jewelry.

Many superstitions have been attached to the opal throughout history. It has been believed to be a lucky stone by many cultures and has often been considered a symbol of hope.

Opals have had a reputation of having supernatural powers, or of being bad luck to any but the wearer. Some diamond dealers of the past sought to slow the popularity of opals, once they became more available after their discovery in Australia, resurrecting some of the negative beliefs about opals.
