The time has come to make a decision. We have spent some time the last three meetings discussing the five year initiative relative to the shop and the SNGMS's plans going forward.

- 3) start the process of putting together a fund to purchase our own building of appropriate size.

There have been examples of ways to fund raise but in a nutshell, the majority of the funds would be internally recruited (remember from previous research and presentations, we cannot qualify for a mortgage of the size required on our own).

So make an effort to come to the next meeting to participate in making the decision that could guide the SNGMS's future abilities to continue to grow and teach not only new members, but the kids of existing members.

#### **SNGMS Board Meeting Minutes for 9/4/2025**

On September 4, 2025, the regular Board of Directors meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at 4:05 PM at the SNGMS Lapidary Shop and Education Center by the President.

Minutes: The minutes of the July 31, 2025 meeting were approved as corrected.

**Treasurers Report:** The checking account is down for the month due primarily to payment of Viva Las Vegas Rocks show bill. The investment account is essentially unchanged. Funds will be transferred from investments to checking as we are burning quickly through cash. Recommend increase to dues, class fees, or shop fees.

David Ford proposed, seconded by Harvey Bergeron, and approved by the Board that a proposed increase of \$10 to both the individual and family memberships be brought to the membership.

#### **Unfinished Business:**

The 5-year Strategic Plan was briefly discussed by Mary Savage.

Proposed membership fees implementation was discussed and the tri-fold flyer required edits were identified, updating emails, website url, and membership costs.

Lisa Wiemers, as Historian, provided a list of document retention policies that can be incorporated into the SNGMS By-Laws. Mike Kirk will organize a committee to make recommendations on modified By-Laws to be presented to the Board and then to the General Membership for approval.

Google for Nonprofits usage will start to be implemented with addition of relevant persons and by providing written instructions for access.

Orville Wiemers reported on the Cab Machine Wheel Review Team. Procurement of wheels will remain unchanged for now, but testing of alternative wheels and refurbishment alternatives will be considered and tested. For now the machines will be designated for soft or hard materials.

**SNGMS Lapidary Shop Report:** Kerry Wenzl reports that there is extensive trim saw blade damage. Issues with use of equipment and with checking member id to use shop was discussed.

**Viva Las Vegas Rocks Show:** Andrea Packo reports that 39 vendor booths have been sold and 3 reserved out of a total of 61 booths. Facebook ads are being placed.

#### **New Business:**

The possibility of online advance class payment was discussed, and the decision was made that it required too much manual intervention to make it work. Advance deposit of funds in shop was recommended instead.

Board meeting adjourned at 6:10 pm.

When Cliff first came to the club, he mainly collected petrified wood. As with most things, when Cliff was interested in something, he would learn all he could. He mastered identifying and aging petrified wood. He soon branched out into collecting fossils, local rocks and fluorescent rocks.


He became the go-to guy when it came to fluorescence. Cliff's fluorescent collection grew and became museum quality. He joined the Fluorescent Mineral Society and developed connections and friends from all over the U. S. and the world. Cliff shared his knowledge with club members, the Kids club, schools, and the general public. He would take visitors and members night hunting to find awesome fluorescents.

Cliff was enlisted as fieldtrip chairman. He would thoroughly research sites for quality material and safety. Some of the locations were in the middle of nowhere. Cliff would find specimens he liked, share the extras, and would always be there to help others find great samples.

It was an adventure to rockhound with Cliff, whether he took us to incredibly beautiful vistas, an isolated mine dump in the middle of the desert, an abandoned mine, or had to drive on roads that were so full of bumps that you'd be happy for seat belts.

Duane Matters and Cliff were rock brothers, Eagle members and collected for over 20 years together. Many of us were lucky enough to accompany them on some of their expeditions.

Cliff was a character and we each have our own special stories and memorable moments with him. He left a void in the club that will be hard to fill and will be greatly missed.



# Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks Perfectly Matched Earring Wires

Excerpted from https://door44studios.com/how-to-make-perfectly-matched-ear-wires-every-time/

- 1. Straighten a length of 20 gauge wire by running it through a pliers with nylon jaws a few times. Once the wire is straight, measure and cut one 4-inch piece of 20 gauge wire.
- 2. Mark the center point of the wire with a fine-point Sharpie.
- 3. The key to creating matching ear wires is to make both wires at the same time. Use flat nose pliers to form a sharp 90-degree

bend at the center mark of the 4-inch wire. Then fold the wire in half by gradually tightening the bend until the two ends of the wire are parallel.

- 4. Tighten the fold by squeezing it firmly with the tips of your flat nose pliers.
- 5. Check the cut ends of your wire to make sure they're even. If not, trim the wire so that both ends are the same length. Lightly sand the ends with sandpaper or an emory board to round the ends of the wires and to remove any sharp edges.
- 6. Create a small loop for each of the two ear wires. This where you will attach the earring dangle. Create the loop by winding the two loose ends of the wire around the 2 mm step on bail-making pliers until the ends touch the straight length of the wire.
- 7. Center the wire loops on the 9 mm step -the largest step on your bail-making pliers.

#### **Equipment & Supplies**

20 guage wire
Fine Sharpie marker
Ruler
Nylon jaw pliers
Flat nose pliers
Stepped bail-making pliers
Sand paper or emory board
Flush cutter or jeweler's saw



Step 8

- 8. Wrap the straight lengths of the wire as far around the 9mm mandrel as you can go to create a large loop.
- 9. Place the two loose ends of the wire at the center of the 3 mm step (the second step) on your bail-making pliers. Wrap the wire about halfway around the pliers. Make sure this bend is in the opposite direction of the large ear hook you made in Step 8.
- 10. Use flush cutters or a jeweler's saw to cut off the folded edge of the wire so the two ear wires can separate. Lightly sand the ends with sandpaper or an emory board to round the ends of the wires and to remove any sharp edges.
- 11. Optionally, you can solder the loops for the earring dangle closed and/or flatten the wires by lightly hammering them against a steel block with a small hammer.

CONGRATULATIONS – you just created a pair of matched ear wires!



Doris Currington was the person who located the claim by pacing out the boundaries for the Clark County Gem Collectors (CCGC). The tuff that was the basis for the claim was piled where the sign for the claim is currently located. The tuff has been crushed by foot and vehicle traffic, and is no longer in a pile. The Ore Car claim is a lode claim. This means the claim boundaries can run In any direction to follow the mineral lode (placer claims can only run north-south).

Doris said this about the claim: "Before we filed the mining claim way back when the ore car mine site it was called the 'Potato Patch.' Just before you went down into the wash on the left side of [the] road and across [the] wash were small nodules. Like Potatoes. They were swirl agate. Long gone by the [19]60's."

Initially, the mine was a long, open trench about two feet deep. For safety and liability reasons, the CCGC covered it. Roy Beeson, Don Van Hoy, and Doris Currington began the tradition of placing unwanted rocks from their collections at the mine for others to take. The Las Vegas Public Broadcasting System channel, KLVX Channel 10, produced a show about the claim for the Outdoor Nevada program sometime before 2017.



# **Mineral Musings**

#### Jasper

Jasper is a mineral that is primarily composed of silica. Other trace elements and impurities give it unique colors and patterns. Jasper is a member of the chalcedony family and is usually opaque. Jasper is a common mineral found in many locations around the world, including the United States, Australia, Brazil, Egypt, and India. The word jasper means "spotted or speckled stone," and comes from the Old French word "jaspre."

The colors of jasper are usually red, yellow, brown or green, and rarely blue. Red is the most common color and is due to iron. During formation of jasper, silica-rich water flows through porous sedimentary rocks, and over time, the silica accumulates and forms deposits. The silica can come from volcanic ash, marine organisms, and groundwater.

Jasper can also form through silicification, which occurs when organic material, such as wood or bone, is replaced by silica. This can happen when the organic material is buried in sedimentary rock, and silica-rich groundwater flows through the rock. Then the organic material is replaced with chalcedony.

So what's the difference between jasper and agate? Jasper and agate are both made of quartz. Both jasper and agate are varieties of chalcedony. These gemstones have very fine grains and are smooth and shiny. Agate is translucent and has banded patterns, while jasper is opaque and has a variety of patterns, including bands, spots and striations. One

way to tell the two apart is by holding a light behind the stone. If the light shines through, it's an agate. If it doesn't, it's jasper.

There are several types of jasper. Landscape jaspers, or picture jaspers, are a type of jasper that look like (lol, surprisingly) landscapes when cut. The most famous type is Owyhee Picture Jasper (pronounced Oh-WAH-hee), which looks like rolling, brown hills under a blue sky. The stones are found in the Owyhee mountains on the Idaho-Oregon border.




**Brecciated Jasper** 

Brecciated jasper looks like broken stones roughly glued back together. They're most often found in areas that are prone to earthquakes, such as California. Lavic Jasper, found near Ludlow, California can be brecciated.

Other types of jaspers include mookaite from Australia, poppy jasper, and orbicular jasper.

The word "jasper" is often used to describe any colorful stone that probably is silica-rich. While beautiful, they're not a jasper! This includes rain forest jasper (rhyolite), bumblebee jasper (complex mineral mix that includes arsenic), Dalmatian jasper (rhyolite), and crocodile jasper (another rhyolite sometimes mistakenly ided as a stromatolite fossil).
